Course Description

UNIVERSITY CATALOG COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course introduces students to foundational knowledge, methods, and skills for designing human-centered user experience (UX) around interactive systems. Students will become familiar with user research, concept generation, design methods, and user evaluation. In addition, students will also learn how to collaborate in a team setting, communicate design rationales, and present compelling narratives about their work.

The class will be structured with lectures, hands-on design activities such as design critiques, projects, and presentations.

PRE-REQUISITES FOR THE COURSE

I 301 Introduction to Informatics is a co-requisite for this course.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Students will be able to apply foundational design knowledge, methods and skills to create effective and compelling user experience and products.



- 2. Students will also be able to evaluate design solutions with peers and users and communicate their design effectively.
- 3. Students will gain experiences with defining and solving problems as a team.

Course Requirements and Grading

REQUIRED MATERIALS

All course readings will be available via the course Canvas site.

REQUIRED DEVICES

You need laptops to download the readings and complete the assignments. You will also need to bring your laptop for in-class exercises.

For the lecture and discussion components of the class, I will initially allow the use of laptops. However, if they impede learning or if class discussion is not optimal, this policy will be reconsidered.

CLASSROOM ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION

Students are expected to attend every class and give mid-term and final project presentations in person. As this course is very interactive, you will be engaging with your classmates in discussions, collaborative exercises, and peer reviews. Remote attendance is not an option.

Absences will only be excused in situations following university policy (illness, religious holy days, participation in University activities at the request of university authorities, and compelling absences beyond your control) with proper documentation and timely notification (prior to class for non-emergencies).

ASSIGNMENTS

The following table represents how you will demonstrate your learning and how we will assess the degree to which you have done so.

Sketches: Sketching is a common practice used by designers to reflect on existing objects and interactions, and brainstorm ways of improving them. Note that it is not about the quality of sketches, but the **quantity**, i.e. generating tons of ideas! For this class, you will sketch situations and ideas that you encounter in your daily life for ten weeks. Bring them to class every Wednesday so you can receive credit for this weekly assignment.

Reading discussion: Throughout the semester, you will be assigned readings carefully chosen from foundational textbooks on UX. These readings will guide our class discussion and activities, so it will be important to read the assigned readings before the classes according to the schedule.

Students will post their reading responses on the canvas site on the weeks with required readings. These reading responses are meant to help students reflect on what they have learned, what they disagree with the readings, and what lingering questions they have. Reading responses should be of reasonable length (200+ words). Your reading responses will be graded for quality and originality. I expect you would spend the first paragraph



summarizing the readings and the rest of the response would be to elaborate your reflections and questions. You can relate it to your personal experiences, your own coursework or projects, or other courses you have taken.

Reading discussions are due every Monday and Wednesday by 12 pm. No late work will be accepted.

Individual Projects: Throughout the semester, you will complete two individual projects: 1) understanding user experiences and 2) critiquing and redesigning user interfaces. Detailed guidelines will be provided on the canvas site.

Group Project: You will form your own team to complete one group project. Detailed guidelines will be provided on the canvas site. We will conduct teamwork **peer evaluation** surveys after the mid-term and final presentations. In the survey, you will be asked to evaluate your teammates, including yourself, and your collaboration experiences. The survey results will be factored into the team project grade, which may result in different team project grades for different students. For example, if a student has not contributed to the team project consistently, the student will get a lower team project grade than their teammates.

Bonus Points: Students may receive up to 2 bonus points by completing additional assignments. I will announce the specific assignments during the semester.
